

Agency seeks 'partners' for successful re-entries

RALEIGH | Secretary **Theodis Beck** challenged members of the Prisoner Re-entry Initiative (PRI) Advisory Committee to find community partners to help offenders successfully re-enter society at the group's initial meeting in early October.

"Released offenders must have jobs and places to live or things go downhill quickly," Beck said. "This program gives them a sense of hope for a second chance and we all win in the end."

PRI is a national initiative designed to strengthen communities through an employment-centered program for recently released offenders. The PRI Advisory Committee, an integral component of the effort, helps to build a seamless re-entry system in North Carolina by bringing leaders from various state and local agencies together to support the program.

Roshanna Parker, who oversees the Office of Transition Services, said the three-year program initially will concentrate on community and faith-based employment related projects in Mecklenburg, New Hanover, Nash and Edgecombe counties to try to connect offenders with the proper help they will need in re-entry efforts.

Nicole Sullivan, director of Research and Planning, explained that the Division of Prisons releases about 27,000 inmates each year while taking in about 29,000, or about a 2 percent growth rate. About 86 percent of those released each year have no further supervision.

"We want to prevent them from coming back," Sullivan said, referring to efforts to reduce the rate of recidivism. "This group should shape policy changes around the state to make some headway in solving problems and to improve opportunities to relieve the pressures of re-entry."

She emphasized that offender must be able to overcome housing, employment and possible substance abuse issues upon release.

Beck added, "We want a process, not a program to get them ready to leave. We can't afford to keep recycling these people in and out of the prison system."

The secretary said the state cannot afford to keep building new prisons, and that this program can save the state money while keeping the state safer.

The initial meeting was attended by representatives from numerous state, federal and community agencies from across the state who are being asked to work toward common goals of reducing recidivism, increase employment opportunities, improve job retention rates and increase the average earnings of participants. PRI also is designed to provide pre-release and post-release employment services to participants, said PRI grant coordinator **Victor Marrow**.

"Not only is this a good business decision, it's the right thing to do," Beck said.

Foothills supervisor leads SEANC

RALEIGH | **Tony Smith** of Morganton was elected president of the State Employees Association of North Carolina, SEIU Local 2008, at the association's annual convention in Greensboro on Sept. 5.

Maintenance crew trims cost, time building Harnett CI barber school

LILLINGTON | The motto for the maintenance staff at Harnett Correctional Institution used to be: "Get 'er done." They should have a new one: "Got 'er done."

With more than 300 years of experience among them, the 14-member maintenance staff was faced with an overwhelming assignment in May. They were asked to construct a new facility to house the new barber school and barber shop training program at the facility.

In only four months, the job was completed on schedule by Sept. 1. Done.

The barber school presented an open house on Oct. 14 to show off the new facility in Lillington. The facility is a cooperative effort among the Division of Prisons, the North Carolina Board of Barber Examiners and Central Carolina Community College.

Twenty inmates will make up the initial class, the first of its kind in the prison system. It is representative of the many different job-training programs the department continues to implement in its efforts to prepare offenders for securing gainful employment following their release from incarceration and for leading law-abiding lives in the community.

"Under normal circumstances, maintenance crews are not asked to take on a job of this magnitude," said **Mike Hall**, maintenance supervisor. "We were asked if we could do it in the time frame needed and we did it."

Ron West, who supervised the brick work and roof subcontractors, said the most

stressful part of the job was the delay in getting materials and facing the deadline of finishing by the end of August.

The job involved demolishing part of the old maintenance shop and renovating the remainder. All of the work, except the roof construction, was performed by the Harnett maintenance staff at a cost of about \$195,000.

The 2,578-square-foot facility includes a spacious barber shop training room with 10 new chairs and fully equipped barber tools, classrooms and secured storage areas.

"We hope people understand what a big job we had to do," said **Alan Tart**, who oversaw the plumbing operations. "What we did should redefine what a state employee is - we are hard workers."

Hall is extremely proud of his crew. He cites his assistant, **J.D. Bass**, with playing a key role in getting the project completed, despite being off work for four weeks after suffering a heart attack.

Others on the team include: **Wayne Wood**, **Eddie Stanley**, **Ryan Locklear**, **Jack Faircloth**, **Gary Parrish**, **Jeff Matthews** and **Debbie Ray**.

"This job was over and above what is normally required of a maintenance crew at an organization," said **Jerry Carroll**, assistant director of prisons - Facility Services. "They really stepped up to the plate and did a fantastic job and came through with flying colors."

Community Corrections District 19A

CONCORD | Tucked between Rowan County to its north and Mecklenburg County to its south, Cabarrus County is known as “a dynamic place to live and work.” It has Concord Mills, rated the No. 1 tourist destination in the state, and Lowe’s Motor Speedway, “the center of American motorsports.”

Cabarrus County is also the Division of Community Corrections’ District 19A.

With Judicial District Manager Catherine Combs at the helm, her office of 27 officers and six administrative staff members, are responsible for the supervision of 1,751 probationers, parolees and offenders sentenced to community service work.

Combs’ Chief Probation/Parole Officers are **Danny Payne, Ronda Powell and David Calloway**.

Combs believes the district has been successful in carrying out the divisional and departmental mission of public safety.

“We have effective programs, utilizing alternatives to incarceration when needed,” she said. “And they are effective because we have committed employees carrying out those programs and providing meaningful supervision.”

In her managerial role, Combs also strives to ensure the officers and staff are effective.

The district is heavily and favorably involved in Project Safe Neighborhoods, a federal initiative to reduce gun crime. It networks local law enforcement, including community partners, and provides them with needed additional resources.

“It is especially pleasing to see the cooperation and partnering that we have among our criminal justice agencies in the district,” Combs said.

Criminal Justice Partnership Program

The CJPP has successfully used CARE (Carolina Addiction and Recovery Environment) to provide intensive outpatient substance abuse therapy and regular outpatient therapy to intermediate-sentenced offenders. The program is used primarily for offenders convicted of drug offenses or where drugs were the primary motivators in committing the offense.

As a satellite substance abuse program resource center, CARE also provides offenders help in obtaining their high school diplomas, gaining employment and participating in programs that facilitate rehabilitation.

Eighty-nine percent of the 80 admissions to the CJPP in Cabarrus County during FY 2007-2008 were from the courts. Eleven percent resulted from probation violations/intensive probation and were court-ordered to the program. Forty percent of those in the program successfully completed it, and 56% obtained or maintained employment while in the program.

Effective employees

Drawing attention to and supporting the staff has been a hallmark of District 19A.

Marie Stegall, a community service coordinator, is the current District Officer of the Year, recognized for her annual coordination of the annual spring and fall Litter Sweeps in Cabarrus County. Central Carolina Community College, which has a long-standing relationship as an educational partner with Harnett CI, will staff and administer both the barbering program and the barber shop operation.
